A Note From the Public Theologian

I can't believe it's almost been a year since my appointment to the role of Public Theologian! It's been an absolute pleasure being able to engage with SCMers all over the Motu -- and internationally over the last year.

I have few doxa, but one of them is: never do theology alone. This approach towards collaboration and thinking together is difficult because it means working slowly, engaging with differences in opinion, and leaning into a vulnerable uncertainty. And yet, despite the added administrative epistemological challenges, working this way is so rewarding. This year, SCM has embodied this collective, partnered, and collaborative approach o host events, write submissions on government and engage policies, with sticky contemporary topics.


There is beauty in encountering differing viewpoints and a variety of opinions. Each of us comes with our own multiplicity, and reaching out beyond ourselves highlights the beautiful diversity within each one of us.

I've also found that it can be easy to slip into an over-romanticising of the beauty of diversity. Representation of different viewpoints is not necessarily a good in itself, but encountering difference allows us to see the ways our systems and our theologies uphold structures that work for some and not others.

I'm struck by a quote from Sophie Lewis, a scholar in feminist, queer, and transgender studies. "The history of feminism is so capacious as to contain within itself its own enemies. And there really are enemy feminisms, which is not to say there are any totally 'unproblematic', you know, angelic feminisms or something, but I do think that some level of confusion can be averted by identifying the ones that are actually in-and-of-themselves antiliberatory."

The quote must be wrestled with on its own terms, but I also find it so perfectly applicable to Christianity. Diversity teaches us about the way things are built. And it forces us to ask: is the building fit for purpose? Of course, critical disability theology asks this question literally. Our church buildings are notoriously inaccessible. But disability theology -- along with other voices -- asks it metaphorically as well. Is our theology liberatory? And liberatory for whom?
